We've enjoyed the social aspects of the Club and believe that it is one of the features that has made our Section successful for so many years.

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


Mike McKinnon will take over the role of Club President and the change has been approved by the Board of Directors.

Winter Driving Clinic

Ottawa Section member, Josef Ferner has been busy organizing a Winter Driving Clinic being offered through the Calabogie Motorsport Park.

As we can all attest to, winter driving in

our area can be very challenging at times and even the most experienced drivers can find themselves in precarious circumstances. What better way to keep ourselves and our passengers safe than by having some training, offered by professional drivers, on how to deal with the hazards posed by winter driving?

The Winter Driving Clinic is a full day course to learn winter driving skills held in the snowy paddock of Calabogie Motorsport Park. The clinic will cover emergency braking, accident avoidance, slalom, and skid control. Any car or truck is permitted; no helmets or special equipment are necessary.

The clinic will include approximately 1.5 hours of classroom theory and each participant will get 2 hours of track time to practice driving skills. Driving Coaches will accompany drivers in their vehicles for the driving events.

Winter tires are not required on your vehicles.

Sessions will be limited to 22 persons per day.

Joe has been able to negotiate a group rate with Calabogie Motorsports Park (CMP) for the one day clinic. The regular price is

the group rate.

Available dates are January 26, January 27, Feb 9th, Feb 10th. We do need to provide the numbers for registration by no later than December 25th.

Note that there are no refunds within 7 days of the scheduled clinic date and there is a \$100 administration fee to reschedule within 7 days of the scheduled date.

Participants will be required to sign a MBCA participation form prior to attending the event.

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The Story of the Mercedes Star

The stories of the Mercedes star and the laurel wreath began – quite separately from one another – 17 years before the merger. On 6 August 1909, Benz & Cie. submitted an application to have the "Benz" lettering surrounded by a laurel wreath registered as a trademark to the Imperial Patent Office.

In its formative years, the Mercedes star was used without a surrounding ring. Primarily it adorned the radiators, but it was also sometimes seen on the sides of the bonnets of Mercedes passenger cars, often still combined with the "Mercedes" lettering.

The laurel wreath was taken from the Benz symbol, the three-pointed star from Daimler-Motoren-Gesellschaft.

The three sections on the Star represent "Sky, Sea, Earth", which refer to the three areas that Daimler provided engines - aviation, marine and ground transportation.

It was from these beginnings that one of the world's most recognized trademarks still used to this day was developed.



This symbol was entered on the Register of Trademarks on 10 October 1910.

Daimler-Motoren-Gesellschaft had already applied for legal protection for the Mercedes-Benz star on 24 June 1909. It was entered on the Register of Trademarks on 9 February 1911.

Looking back, the fact that both car makers registered their new trademarks in the summer of 1909 seems to mirror the events of 1886, since this was when Gottlieb Daimler and Carl Benz invented the car powered by the fast-running internal combustion engine — without even having any knowledge of one another.

Some 23 years later, the two still competing companies pointed the way ahead with their new brand symbols, by immediately using them as a badge and signet on their respective vehicles.

Finally, on 18 February 1925, both brands registered their new shared logo – Daimler's Mercedes star in Benz's laurel wreath. This was a highly symbolic action in anticipation of the merger, which became effective on 28 June 1926.





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
